Before Leaving Australia I took German language and culture classes and received a level A1 in German language, it was a very good insight into the upcoming experience I was about have, the application process and getting enrolled was fairly straight forward once I was accepted.

Upon arrival in Stuttgart after landing and staying with my girlfriend's family in Hamburg I was greeted with open arms. Agnieszka Halina made the process of finding classes, and logging onto the network in DHBW easy. Alongside those essential things Aga in collaboration with the international office put together a package of necessary information for all the international students. The professor I worked with on my project class Pr. David Suendermann-Oeft is possibly the smartest yet so easy to work with and relaxed person I have ever met. I had the classes' machine learning and speech processing with him with a current ongoing project for Stuttgart's VVS (Transport System). The lab meetings for this class were every Monday at 4pm and half of the students would use google hangouts to attend the meeting as some had internships or were part of cross university collaboration.

Through David I met Ahmed who I was to work with on the VVS System later becoming good friend's, Ahmed and I gelled over similar interests and hung out quite a lot if it involved just talking about life experiences, throwing the NFL ball I brought from Kanstadt sports, or even hiring DB bikes and riding around the city.

- Use the resources you are giving as best you can, this could be with things such as money, help from people around you, or just general information from people with better knowledge of the culture.
- If you are planning for a long stay such as a years learn the local lingo, it will make life easier in some situations.

DHBW-Stuttgart really accommodated me well for my first semester and I have decided to continue a second semester there, working closely with a professor on a project was a new experience to me and I really enjoyed it. The international office was very helpful and for me Agnieszka Halina was a huge help with me getting enrolled and all courses organized even before I left Australia.
